I could not have completed the course without the constant support of the three young men who accompanied me. They were amazingly supportive, enthusiastic and caring of our team throughout the experience. Along with many other teams from Rothwell and Caboolture, Kokoda was an unforgettable experience.

The long term goal for Tommy Peak is to take on the 'real' Kokoda in 2020! Watch this space...



Staying on the topic of the outdoors, our Googa program is now at an end for another year. Brad and Chris Teakle along with their amazing team at Googa, care for, nurture, grow and challenge our young people through the outdoor education program. This four weeks away is THE most memorable experience for our students and one that is talked about even many years after the experience.

While on the Kokoda Challenge, the Year 11 students I was with regaled me with many special and memorable moments from the Googa experience. I was even educated with some walking games the Googa leaders had shared with them. The challenge reminded them very much of the Googa hike. Students hike for up to 20 kilometres a day through rough terrain, with a map, compass, CB radio and a hike backpack – no small feat! But they do it! Year after year, our students challenge themselves and feel exhilarated after completing the hike. A highlight of Googa.

As the Year 9 cohort now commence planning for their Googa experience at the end of this year and into next, for the 31st year, the Googa campsite is being made available to them. Brad, Chris and the team are highly regarded by our students and staff for their professionalism, love and support of all of our students. Like at Grace, each individual student is valued and special to them. We are so blessed to know and have them as part of our extended community.

Another outdoors story...the new look Design Technology classroom has been very well used by many students. The classroom is very adaptable with an alfresco option trialled last week by a group of Year 9 students. They were inspired by the outdoors and while soaking up some Vitamin D they made some further alterations to their design project. How is this for a flexible learning space – the outdoors!



The on-line calendar is a valuable resource to explore with your child. It contains up-to-date information regarding assessment, events and activities happening for your child throughout the year. Parent Lounge also has a range of information pertinent to your child. This platform is created to specifically hold information related to your child. Please make yourself familiar with these on-line resources so you are informed about your child's educational needs.

Counselling services at the College are available for your child to access. Dale Dearman our School Counsellor heads up the team consisting of Rosie Knijnenberg, Youth Chaplain and Jenna, our visiting on-site psychologist from Involve Psychology. Students can ask for support directly from the team near the Ministry office or they can firstly see any staff member who can guide them to the appropriate level of care and support they require specific to their circumstance. Parents are welcome to engage with the College about the counselling and support on offer.

After attending a couple of P & F meetings this term, in my role as Acting Head of Campus, it was made clear to me how disengaged some parents feel from the everyday workings of the school. Especially coming from primary school, where the environment allows for more natural connections to occur, it can be quite daunting to engage with the College. The College has staff, who just like you want the best for our students. We are people, who are experienced in the role of educating and caring for adolescents. Our experiences, like yours, are varied. What brings us together is our fundamental mission of, by the grace of God, being a Christian community; aiming to prepare young people for a life and faith and service so God will be glorified in the world.'

With Parent/Teacher/Student Interviews, once again just around the corner, we look forward to engaging with you in discussion and support of your child. Your child will be the star of the show in this interview time as they share with you and the Home Class teacher, their achievements, their challenges they faced and what plans they have to improve on performance in various subjects into the future. One of the keys to the grandparent-grandchild relationship is that **MOST GRANDPARENTS PRIORITISE THE RELATIONSHIP WITH THEIR GRANDCHILD OVER THE RULES.** This is typically seen in the way that grandparents spoil their grandchildren. They feed them treats, buy them gifts and turn a blind eye to things that they would have jumped right onto with their own children. This sometimes happens to the chagrin of the parents who have been working hard to maintain standards of discipline..... My... how their parents have changed since the grandkids came along!!! The image below pretty well sums it up:

Clearly something happens when the grandkids come along and it's like the rules don't matter as much anymore - it's the relationship that matters most.

In some ways, grandparents give a picture of what God is like toward us. Now, God does give us standards or rules to live by or he disciplines us when we stray but **THE RULES ARE ALWAYS SECONDARY TO RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD.** In fact the rules are mostly about giving us guidance and boundaries so that we have healthy relationships. It's interesting that when Jesus came to earth his catch-cry was "follow me" (Mark 1:17). It wasn't "follow these rules" or "follow this formula." He said "follow **ME.**" It's about a relationship and it's like he was saying "stick close to me - do what you see me doing - grow a relationship with me and when you do you'll keep the rules you need to keep anyway." Relationship is more important than the rules, or as maths teachers would say: **RELATIONSHIPS > RULES.**

REMINDER OF ACADEMIC PROCEDURES REGARDING ASSESSMENTS - LATE & NON SUBMIT

The student diary has information regarding a number of procedures at the College including 'Late and Non Submission' of assessments. If your child has been unwell and requires an extension on their assessment, they will need to bring in a Medical Certificate and/or a note/email from a parent to the relevant teacher and assessment deadlines can be re-negotiated. In regard to assessment handed in late, the procedure states that all assessment has until 5:00PM to be submitted on the due date (unless otherwise stipulated on their task sheet). If the student is not on campus, they need to submit this electronically. Where a student submits an assessment after the deadline, the task cannot be graded and a draft will be marked instead.

In cases where a student has experienced technology failure (e.g. losing work on their computers, losing a USB etc) this is not an acceptable reason for extension in a high school setting. Students are reminded to back up their work regularly and we also encourage you to remind your child about the importance of backing up their work. Some students do this by having multiple USB's or emailing their assignment to themselves and/or parent regularly.

All procedures are written in order to adequately prepare students for the requirements of Senior School along with tertiary and workplace requirements beyond their Grace schooling as echoed by our Mission Statement.

SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS

With Term 2 coming to an end, assessment for senior school students is in full swing. At these times it is natural to experience an increase in feelings of stress as deadlines are prepared for and met. The new Schooltv.me link on the GLC homepage is a useful resource in obtaining strategies to help students and parents cope with assessment periods whilst in the midst of studying. Dr Michael Carr-Gregg, one of Australia's leading child and adolescence psychologists, suggests that even though students may be busy with the pressures of assessment, it is still very important for them to have balance in their lives. Students taking responsibility for when they study and when they socialise can be a very empowering strategy.

"When it comes to productive study, sometimes less is often more. It is recommended that students hit the books in 50-minute stints, broken up by 15-minute breaks. This gives the brain, and body, a rest. Adolescents will often underestimate the amount of sleep they need. Getting enough sleep is key to successful study practices." (Schooltv.me)

QCS PREPARATION DURING BLOCK EXAMS FOR YEAR 12

During Block Exam time, Year 12 OP students will undertake QCS practice tests at both campuses. These days are noted on the Block Exam schedule. Attendance is compulsory for students sitting QCS in September; this includes Non-OP students who have elected to sit QCS. **THESE WILL BE THE LAST PRACTICE TESTS BEFORE THE QCS TEST ON 3 AND 4 SEPTEMBER. IT IS THEREFORE VITALLY IMPORTANT THAT STUDENTS ARE PRESENT AND FOCUSED TO DO THEIR BEST.** Practice tests will be sent for external marking and individual feedback will be given to students in due course, so they can see where they can improve.

Students not sitting the QCS test are not required to attend school on the QCS practice test day.

ROTHWELL CAMPUS:

The final QCS preparation test session for Term 2 will be held on the last day of Block Exams i.e. **WEDNESDAY 26 JUNE**. On this day, students will undertake a Writing Task in the morning and Multiple Choice in the afternoon. **STUDENTS NEED TO BRING A CALCULATOR TO THE MULTIPLE CHOICE TEST. ALL OTHER EQUIPMENT WILL BE PROVIDED.**

CABOOLTURE CAMPUS:

QCS STUDENTS WILL DO THEIR PRACTICES ON SUBSEQUENT DAYS IN TERM 2 BLOCK EXAMS – TUESDAY 25 JUNE (am - Short Response Items and pm - Multiple Choice) **AND WEDNESDAY 26 JUNE** (am - Writing Task

and pm - Multiple Choice). **STUDENTS NEED TO BRING AN APPROVED CALCULATOR TO ALL SESSIONS EXCEPT THE WRITING TASK.** All other equipment will be provided.

'THE REAL THING'

Please note that all Year 12 students in Queensland who wish to receive an OP will sit the QCS Test on **TUESDAY 3 AND WEDNESDAY 4 SEPTEMBER**. The sessions will be as follows: Day 1 am Writing Task, Day 1 pm Multiple Choice I, Day 2 am Short Response Items, Day 2 pm Multiple Choice II. If students are unable to sit for all or part of the test, they must apply for Absentee Exemption, in order to remain OP eligible. Students will be provided with information about this in August.

EXCITING NEWS FOR YEAR 12 STUDENTS YOU COULD WIN AN APPLE IPAD PRO PRIZE PACK!!

In order for students to track their progress towards a QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education), Year 10 students are registered with the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) and receive a **LUI (LEARNER UNIQUE IDENTIFIER). THIS NUMBER APPEARS ON STUDENTS' I/D CARDS AND IS USED TO LINK ALL STUDIES THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE QCE.** Outside providers e.g. other RTO's, TAFE and AMEB also report to QCAA using this number. All Year 10 to 12 students (OP and Non-OP) have a QCAA Learning Account, which contains details of all their QCE studies.

If they have not already done so, Year 12 Students need to log into the [QCAA WEBSITE](#) using the **LUI ON THEIR STUDENT I/D CARD** and an **INITIAL PASSWORD (DDMM OF THEIR DATE OF BIRTH)** to activate their account and check Personal and Enrolment details. **FOR THOSE STUDENTS WHO HAVE LOGGED ON PREVIOUSLY, THEY SHOULD USE THE NEW PASSWORD THEY SET AT THAT TIME.**

The QCAA magazine "Student Connect" is currently being issued to all Year 12 students at both campuses. A guide about how to log into QCAA Learning Accounts appears in the panel titled **"WIN AN IPAD PRO PRIZE PACK" ON THE FINAL PAGE OF THE BOOKLET PAGE 16.**

MOOTING

In year 11 and 12, Legal Studies Students are invited to compete in a variety of Mooting competitions for high school students. Mooting is a form of debating where teams argue one side of a legal appeal case in a mock court room in front of a judge.

This year Grace has entered three teams, two Year 11 teams in the USQ Secondary Schools Mooting Competition, and one team in the Bond University National High School Mooting Competition.

Year 11 students - Charlotte Holmes, Sophie Linnell, Tiger Lily Chau, Georgia Dawson, Iysha Nicholas, Harrison Bawden, Regan Brown and Saim Chaudhary participated in the USQ competition. Both teams worked extremely hard, receiving excellent feedback from the judge on a criminal appeal on highly technical aspects of criminal law including proceeds of crime and the correct application of the parity principle. Up against some tough competition, Tiger Lily and Iysha won their first moot, however were unsuccessful on their second attempt. Harrison, Regan and Saim narrowly lost both their moots, however the high standard of each moot saw them make the finals which start next term in Toowoomba.

Year 12 students Isabella Lee and Sophie Hobson competed at Bond on the 17th of May on the final day of a two week national competition with teams travelling as far away as Darwin, Perth and Tasmania to take part. 116 teams competed in a civil law negligence moot on a complicated problem involving aspects of contributory negligence and duty of care. Unfortunately they did not make the final 8 teams, however had excellent feedback from the judges.

Participating in Mooting allows students to develop their legal research and legal reasoning skills to construct an argument. Presenting oral arguments to a judge who will interrupt to ask for clarification or elaboration adds another dimension to this difficult task.

BOND UNIVERSITY HIGHSCHOOL MODEL UNITED NATIONS 2019

On the 9 and 10 of May, nine senior debating students attended the third annual Bond University Highschool Model UN (or BUHMUN as it is affectionately called). Six students participated as part of the Model UN Committees, representing countries including Poland, Turkey and the Philippines. The students worked with other nations in committees to draft resolutions on topics including corruption, organised crime and arms trafficking.

Over two days the students heard from Emily Pugin, Second Secretary Australian Embassy; and Permanent Mission to the United Nations in Vienna. She discussed the role of UN committees and gave advice to students on negotiation skills and the importance of reaching consensus. Students put these skills into practice for the committees to come to consensus on the wording of their resolutions.

Additionally for the first time, three Grace students participated in the Journalism stream. Students created videos, published a newsletter and reported live on Facebook. This added a new dimension to the event with delegates able to follow the progress of other committees.

During the award ceremony, Jordyn Reithmuller was presented with an award for best committee coverage.

BUHMUN is a prestigious event, and over the two days students develop skills which assist in their studies and to take on leadership roles within the school community and beyond. It is also an excellent opportunity to network and forge connections with other student leaders.

Students in year 11 or 12 in 2020 who have an interest in international relations, journalism, leadership, politics or law are encouraged to submit an expression of interest to Mrs Salmon towards the end of this year.
